Beautiful Burning Bush - Destroying Our County by Mark Lawlor

It seems that no one is paying much attention to the spread of Burning Bush (or winged euonymus) in our area. Yes, it is a lovely bright red in late fall, but it is massively aggressive and invasive. A well known invasive plant such as bamboo is a small problem compared to this. Bamboo spreads by root, moving about a foot or two per year and staying in that one exact zone. However, once burning bush reaches about 8 feet tall, it spreads out like an umbrella and steals most all light and water from any good ferns and plants on the forest floor. But the worst part is that each mature plant produces hundreds of seeds which are carried and fertilized by birds eating and spreading them. This is fine when you control the weeds in your own garden, but in the unwatched woods of your neighbors and public lands, it has the opportunity to completely take over the woods. If only one neighbor says to leave it alone because it's beautiful in the late fall, then all of the woods in the county are in terrible danger of being overwhelmed by the burning bush. Once a few years go by, the floor of the forest has no variety of plants at all, and all birds and wildlife will suffer.


What can you do to help? Call your local legislators and make the plant illegal to sell at all nurseries and plant stores in your state. Call your local horticulture groups to get them involved. When you see it in yards, tell the landowner that it is terribly invasive. Research how to identify and eradicate it. Pull small plants out by the roots, knock off all the dirt, and hang it on a branch to dry and die. Larger plants may need chemical weed killer. Do not just cut them down and leave the stumps, because just like wild rose, it will come right back. See the photos included showing the close-up photos of how to identify this plant. Like climate change, gypsy moths and spotted lantern fly, we are already late in stopping this problem, but we can try.







Leaves take on a distinctive red color in autumn. The unique feature of burning bush is the brownish, corky "wings" that run up and down each stem, giving rise to the shrub's other common name: winged euonymus. (Euonymus Alatus) brandywine.org conservancy

I would like to bring you up to date on the Brandywine Springs Park Trail Improvement and Bridge Project. The final step in the approval process was addressed at a Historic Review Board meeting on Tuesday, July 2nd. We are now waiting for the official go-ahead from the Park Project Supervisor, Mike Clendaniel. The next step will be to set up an appointment to donate the first phase of the Grant Money from Senator Spiro's Mantzavinos and the State Bond Bill Committee. Both parties, FOBS and NCC Parks Department will sign an agreement stating the details of Phase One of the Trail Improvement Project.

The next steps would be to gather data and project timeline information from the Parks Department Project Team. The information will then be shared with the FOBS Leadership and membership so that communications would be on-going as the actual construction work begins and moves forward.

The Wilmington & Western Railroad Brandywine Springs Historic Express Park tour is September 21st! Mark and Ed will lead the tour group.


